Riversdale House Museum Hosts 200th Anniversary Exhibition of Masterworks

America's First Blockbuster Art Exhibit

From April 7 until October 23, 2016, the Riversdale Historical Society and the Department of Parks and Recreation of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission will mount a special exhibition at the Riversdale House Museum of high-quality reproductions of several paintings included in the most significant private collection of Old World master paintings ever seen in the United States.

The collection included 63 paintings by Peter Paul Rubens, Anthony Van Dyck, Jan Brueghel, Rembrandt and many others. They were brought to America from Belgium by Henri Joseph Stier, the father of Rosalie Calvert. Mrs. Calvert was the wife of George Calvert, a direct descendant of the founder of Maryland.

"We are excited to bring these masterpieces home", said Riversdale Historical Society President Patrick Gossett. "To see reproductions of these incredible works of art on the walls where the originals hung in 1816 will be a thrilling experience for everyone who comes to see them."

The painting collection belonged to the Peeters family of Antwerp, descendants of Michel Peeters, an important 17th century art collector. In 1767, Peeters' granddaughter married wealthy financier Henri Stier, a sixth-generation descendant of Peter Paul Rubens, and Stier acted as the guardian of the Peeters family collection. As French Republican troops marched on Antwerp in 1794, Stier fled with his family and their most valuable possessions, including the painting collection, to the United States. After a short stay in Philadelphia, the family moved to Annapolis, Maryland, where they lived for two years at the William Paca House. It was there that noted painter Rembrandt Peale was shown some of the most important paintings when he came in 1799 to paint the portrait of Henri Stier, a reproduction of which hangs in the Riversdale dining room.

In 1801, the Stiers began construction of Riversdale; they moved into the not quite finished home in the summer of 1802, bringing the paintings with them. But the political situation was changing in Europe, and they began to consider returning to Antwerp to reclaim their Flemish possessions. They sailed from Baltimore in June 1803, leaving Rosalie and George Calvert to finish and occupy the Riversdale mansion, and to care for the painting collection.

For the next 13 years, most of these priceless paintings were stored at Riversdale out of view. Early in 1816, however, Henri Stier asked that the public be allowed to see them before they were returned to him in Antwerp. The Calverts agreed to show the complete collection of 63 masterworks, and Riversdale was opened for several weeks in April 1816 to the art-loving public. This exhibition was the most dazzling display of Old Masters in the New World, and has rarely, if ever, been equaled. At the conclusion of the exhibition, the paintings were packed and shipped out of Baltimore, and arrived in good condition in Antwerp. The current exhibition will celebrate this remarkable collection's stay at Riversdale two centuries ago.

Historian Susan Pearl has worked for more than two decades in an attempt to identify and locate many of the paintings that were housed at Riversdale. Using Henri Stier's packing list of 1794, pertinent 19th-century sales catalogs, the many references to the paintings both in Rosalie Calvert's letters and other contemporary writings, and the generous assistance of Arthur Wheelock of Washington's National Gallery of Art, she has been able to establish the locations of about 20 of the paintings, and to identify several others that were most likely part of the collection. With this information, the Riversdale Historical Society has been able to acquire high-resolution digital images,

which will be printed on canvas and on panel (reproducing the medium of each original painting) and framed. These images will then constitute a virtual “reunion” of a selection of the Peeters-Stier collection.

The exhibition is made possible through a generous grant from ATHA/Maryland Milestones, Inc., and support from the Prince George’s County Historical Society, Prince George’s Heritage, Inc., the Prince George’s County Cultural and Historical Trust, and the Aman Memorial Trust. Eugene B. Roberts, Lynn Roberts, and French Wallop provided additional support.

The exhibition will be open to the public Fridays and Sundays from Noon – 3:30 p.m. and by appointment. Museum admission is \$5.00 for adults, \$4.00 for seniors and groups of 10 or more, and \$2.00 for students.

Riversdale is located at 4811 Riverdale Road, Riverdale Park, MD 20737. The Riversdale Historical Society is a 501(c)(3) non-profit, volunteer organization dedicated to the preservation, protection and presentation of the Riversdale House Museum and Gardens and the Calvert Memorial Park, in cooperation with the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission.

Ward and Committee Reports

Ward Two Report

Spring is here, and I am happy about it! I hope all of you are enjoying it too! My main focus this month has been the Town Charter change, and that will be the main focus of this report as well. But first...

Budget

The budget is being prepared and will be introduced at the May legislative meeting (May 2nd). We have some revenue issues to deal with because a major piece of commercial property came off of the tax rolls this year. We have a full-day meeting of the finance committee to discuss it in detail on May 21st – check the calendar for details. We encourage public participation, so come join us for a fun-filled day of discussing budgets.

M Square

The University of Maryland has proposed “flex-space” development in the M Square area

on the north side of Ward 2, and part of their proposal is to move the College Park Academy to Riverdale Park, just north of Gosling Pond. While I have some concerns about details of the architecture, I think the proposed uses (and building sizes) will be compatible with the residences near the development. Contact me for details if you are curious.

Farmers’ Market

The Farmers' Market is in full swing! It is open every Thursday from 3pm to 7pm in Town Center (near the corner of Rhode Island Avenue and Riverdale Road). Items available this time of year include (but are not limited to) greens, radishes, plants for your garden, mushrooms, free-range hen eggs, roasted coffee, and (I’m still hoping) sugar snap peas (?). ... Not to mention cut flowers, soaps, pottery and a wide variety of prepared foods. I hope to see you at the market!

Charter Change

I’ve made several updates to the proposed changes to the Town Charter (that will move the Town more towards a “Council-Manager” form of government) since last month, based on feedback from other members of the council,

town staff, and residents. Here are some highlights of the modifications I'm proposing:

- Created flexibility so the Council can make sure there's always someone to discharge the duties of Mayor and the Town Manager (including signing checks). This flexibility doesn't exist in the current Charter, and there was a possibility that there could be no acting Mayor (or acting Town Administrator).
- Clarified how the Town Manager will delegate the authority to purchase goods or services.
- Created flexibility so the Council can require announcements of the sort that is now advertised in newspapers to also be sent out through 21st–century media.
- Clarified language in many sections to make it more readable.
- Completely re-wrote the “non-interference” section to make it clear that the Mayor and Council members can, in fact, communicate with town staff in ways other than through the Town Manager (this section is common in other charters, and is needed to attract the highest-quality applicants for the Town Manager job).

There are a few outstanding criticisms about this change that I want to address in the remainder of my report. I'll paraphrase each criticism and then provide my perspective on it.

We're too small for this to make sense – only cities much larger than Riverdale Park have a Council-Manager form of government.

While it is true that the largest municipalities in Maryland (including Bowie, Rockville, Gaithersburg, and College Park) have Council-Manager form of government, so does Denton (population 4,418), Indian Head (population 3,844), La Plata (population 8,753), Pokomoke City, and Princess Anne (both with populations of around 4,000). The City Of Cambridge (population 12,326) recently made the transition. My list isn't exhaustive (I looked at a

few dozen of the 155 municipalities in Maryland), and I was very careful to choose towns and cities that are *definitely* Council-Manager, and a lot of cities and towns our size (7,147 and the size we will be when the Cafritz development is complete – roughly 9,000) have Council-Manager forms of government.

We should only make a change like this after having an outside consultant evaluate our current staffing. You might not know it, but in fact such a study is in the works right now – Councilman Lingua (if my memory is correct) brought it up during last May's budget hearings, and we included the study in the budget; the contract to do the evaluation has probably been awarded by the time you read this article. That being said, I sincerely doubt that the consultant will recommend elimination of the Police Chief or Public Works Director, and those are the only two people who will report to someone different under this proposal. Currently the Police Chief and the Public Works Director report to the Mayor. Under the proposed legislation, they will instead report to the Town Manager. Everyone who works in Public Works or the Police Department will still report to the Directors of those departments, and everyone in General Government will report to the Town Manager rather than the Town Administrator. I'm sure the Town Manager will be able to take the results of the study and implement the changes recommended, but doing it before the transition is not needed. (Ward 2 resident Dannielle Glaros, who has quite a bit of experience in local government, including working for the Town, said at the March 28 work session that she did not believe that the consultant's report is required prior to changing to a Town Manager form of government– she believes this change is a good idea).

This change will result in an increase in the size of the General Government budget because more staff will be needed. We have known for many years that more staff was needed in General Government – I remember discussing this as part of the process of hiring

our current Town Administrator in 2009. During the last budget year we added staff to the budget (a Human Resources director, and a Finance Director), but those positions have only very recently been filled (one is still in the process). We do not anticipate staff beyond these positions being required. This is a long way of saying that the increase in the General Government budget has already happened, and changing to a Town Manager will have an impact, by my estimation, of only the difference in salary between a Town Administrator and Town Manager (which I estimate to be around 10 % of the current Town Administrator's salary + benefits).

To close out my discussion of the Charter Change, I'll quote former College Park Mayor Andy Fellows in an article that appeared in *Greater Greater Washington* magazine in January of 2014. In that article Mayor Fellows said, answering a question about personal challenges in doing the job of Mayor, "My personal challenge is probably time. I end up working 60 or 70 hours a week." College Park has roughly four times the current population of Riverdale Park, and I think that the workload of a Mayor increases with the population, so Mayor Archer (based on Mayor Fellows' estimates) would work 15-20 hours per week if he were doing the same job as Mayor Fellows. Currently, Mayor Archer has both the job that Mayor Fellows had, *plus* the job of chief executive.

I think we've been very lucky to have Mayor Archer working for us for the last 10 years.

Public Works Report

Saturday Drop Off – Scheduled dates in 2016 for drop off of bulk trash on the third Saturday of each month, from 9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m., are: **May 21**, June 18, July 16, August 20, September 17, October 15, November 19, December 17.

Memorial Day – Government offices will be closed. Trash will not be collected. The next collection day will be Thursday, June 1st.

Tree Planting – The Department of Public Works will plant new trees in the community in the spring. Residents wishing to have a tree planted near their homes should contact the department at 301-864-1803 to be placed on our list, not later than May 31, 2016.



Mosquito Control Program – The Town will once again participate in the State/County Mosquito Larviciding/Adulticiding Mosquito Control Program.

Adulticiding will begin May 31, 2016, and run through September 21, 2016. Spraying will be contingent upon the results of their standardized surveillance methods. If the area tested needs to be sprayed, spraying will take place on Tuesday nights. They will not spray if the sprayer encounters too many people on the night of spraying.

In order to reduce the presence of mosquitos, residents must keep their property free of mosquito breeding containers, stagnant water, bird baths, wading pools, pet watering dishes, tin cans, old tires, clogged gutters or flower pots. Other water holding containers should be stored upside down.

Complaints about mosquitos can be faxed to the Maryland Department of Agriculture at 301-422-0502 or call 301-422-5080 with questions or concerns.

Prince George's County Information – To expedite requests for services provided by Prince George's County's, residents should utilize their information number, **which is 311**. Using that number will enable residents to address county related concerns such as questions, complaints, animal control requests, or other service needs for which the county is responsible.

Guide to Public Works – An updated Guide to Public Works is now available for distribution. It is included as part of a packet of public works services and Town resources that all residents will find helpful as they seek information on how to acquire services

in/outside of our community. New residents will find the packets useful for services such as trash/toters, recycling, bulk trash pickup and drop off, yard waste, names of their council members and mayor, and more. In addition, residents can sign up to get the same information sent to them via email by calling the Department of Public Works at 301-864-1803.

Yard Waste Collection - As a reminder, effective January 1, 2014, the Waste Management Division of the Prince George's County Department of Environmental Resources issued a notice (included in resident's August 2013 tax bill) that requires **ALL yard waste** to be placed in brown paper bags or loose in a **clearly marked "YARD WASTE" collection can/container (i.e., trash cans)**. Yard waste will no longer be collected in plastic bags. For additional information, please call 311 or 301-883-5810.

Trash Toter Repair/Replacement – Residents should call the Department of Public Works for the repair or replacement of damaged trash toters, i.e., broken lids, missing wheels, cracked toters, etc. When repairs or replacements are needed, they will occur on Thursday of each week.
