On Monday, June 14, 2010, the RPBA celebrated the 90th anniversary of the town charter with a spectacular event held at Crescent Cities Center. Founder of our organization, Gordon Wells, spoke of how and why the Association came into existence almost 20 years ago and how pleased he was to see the Association grow into what it is today. Betsy Godbey, Director of Crescent Cities Center, provided guests with a colorful account of the old Leland Hospital's role in the community and its transformation into what it is today: Crescent Cities Center, which offers physical therapy, nursing home care and various levels of in-patient and out-patient assisted living services to our community.

Mayor Archer, Councilman Alan Thompson, and Town Administrator Sara Imhulse were in attendance. Mayor Archer spoke of the town's growth and history. Prince George's County had a presence with County Council member, Eric Olson and Danielle Glaros.

Crescent Cities Center, award-winning Chef George prepared a culinary extravaganza for nearly 70 guests. Music was provided by Richard and Audrey, who had played frequently at the Old Riverdale Bookshop.

The Riverdale Business Association is grateful to Director Betsy Godbey, Administrator Bret Stine, and the staff of Crescent Cities Center for making this event so special and memorable.

Mayor's Report

For this summer's issue of the Town Crier, I would like to catch you up on two places of importance to life in Riverdale Park: Well's Run and the Field of Dreams.

Wells Run

Wells Run's headwaters are in Hyattsville around Prince George's and University Mall. It then flows through University Park in a relatively natural state, though clearly forced into a more confined channel than nature would allow. It then flows into Riverdale Park under Baltimore Avenue and is confined to a concrete culvert until just prior to entering the Northeast Branch near Town Hall.

We have a fairly immediate concern for Riverdale Park because the crumbling concrete drainage bed could endanger surrounding homes, roads and bridges. The major fear is that large blocks of concrete could, if broken loose during a major storm, form a dam and actually cause localized flooding instead of managing the storm water.

I began pushing county and state authorities to address this problem four years ago. County Department of Environmental Resources and the Department of Public Works began the initial phase of designing a replacement system more than two years ago. I hope that in about one year we will receive an initial plan for public comment.

Regardless of the design, the project will be expensive to the point that state and probably federal funding will be necessary. To this end I have worked to lay the foundation for such support by educating our state delegation about this need, as well as lobbying Senator Cardin and Representative Hoyer. Our efforts have been well received and I expect that we will be well placed to get the money when the time for construction comes.

Of course the issue is not for Riverdale Park alone, and luckily I have found both Mayor John Tabori of University Park and Mayor Bill Gardiner of Hyattsville willing partners in restoring and managing the water resource of Well's Run. From initial discussions between the mayors, our group expanded to become a formal three-town working group. We formalized this arrangement through an MOU several months back.

Looking forward there are several key interlocking issues for our communities to grapple with. We have discovered that in the headwater area the capacity to control runoff is critical to all other questions of the creek. Initial assessments indicate that an area known as "9 Ponds" between Adelphi Road and the development around the two malls is critical to controlling runoff. We must therefore take an interest and support policies in Hyattsville to utilize 9 Ponds in an environmentally responsible way. **WHAT IS POSSIBLE IN RIVERDALE PARK REDESIGN IS SUBSTANTIALLY DEPENDENT ON WHAT HAPPENS IN THE 9 PONDS AREA** because it will decide how much storm water capacity our part of Wells Run must be able to channel in order to avoid flooding.

We in Riverdale Park will have to work with county and state agencies to decide if we simply seek a rebuild of the existing concrete channel, or do we seek a more natural system with less concrete and more slow moving water features. I can't really comment on what is genuinely possible in a redesigned system until the county agencies present some initial proposals, but it seems clear to me that any substantial changes from the existing all-concrete stream bed will depend on controlling runoff in the headwaters AND Riverdale Park deciding that some existing open space should be used for purposes of water quality improvement and runoff management.

This kind of project clearly requires multiyear commitment to ensure a positive outcome, and I am particularly pleased at the growing coalition of parties that seek a safer and more environmentally responsible future for our region.

Field of Dreams

You might have noticed some new polls and nets at each end of the field. It is increasingly used as a soccer field and in particular the balls that overshoot the goal on the east side are causing a problem with the residence there. Therefore we have put up the nets to control the occasionally overshoot balls. The nets are removable and will be taken down during periods of slow or no use.

One of the major new users is the Ipalteco Ausentes group, immigrants from our sister city Ipalapa, who have also pledged to work with the town government to maintain and improve the field and patrol the grounds for litter. In addition we are hopeful that they will provide several coaches for the Boys and Girls club soccer team also as it is difficult to get such volunteers.

One of the most fun and rewarding things we get to do in Riverdale Park is sponsor and conduct events like Riverdale Park Day, the Easter Egg Hunt, and other family-friendly events. May was a very busy month for the Town, mostly due to the preparation of the FY 11 proposed budget. Mayor and Council met four times to discuss and adjust the budget document, and a budget was adopted on June 7th. You can access the adopted FY 11 from the Town's website, www.riverdaleparkmd.gov.

Town staff have worked very hard this year to realize savings in our daily operating expenses. We have lowered our electricity, natural gas, and long-distance phone rates. We have streamlined our administrative procedures, including upgrades to our financial software and our payroll system. These efforts allow our staff to work more efficiently, which translates to a more effective delivery of services to the community. I am proud of the work that we have done this year to increase our savings opportunities.

National Night Out will be held this year on Tuesday, August 3rd. If you've never participated before, this is a fun opportunity to meet your neighbors and the larger community while promoting crime prevention and drug prevention awareness. There will be a larger gathering at dusk at Riverside Neighborhood Park, and individual Wards may also host a gathering. Finance Committee Report

The Finance Committee met on four evenings during May to review and amend the budget proposed by Mayor Archer. We had heard from constituents, and knew ourselves, that many people are in a tough financial situation and did not want to see increased taxes. The budget as proposed by the Mayor was already lean, but we trimmed a little more from the spending side, and found more non-tax revenue. Because of this the council was able to set a property tax rate such that the average tax bill will be the same as last year. Because property was reassessed last year, individual bills will be up or down — my own tax bill will be higher — but the ***average*** bill will be the same.

A disturbing incident happened in Ward 2 this month underneath the East-West Highway bridge over the Anacostia river. A bicyclist from Hyattsville riding on the hiker-biker trail near the river was attacked by a group of young men, and spent the night in the hospital as a result of injuries he received. Even more disturbing is that two similar incidents occurred near there in the two weeks before his attack. Our police department is investigating, and also working to better coordinate policing of the area with the Park Police, who have primary authority. I hope that we will have good news about the attackers being arrested, hopefully by the time you are reading this article, but regardless of what happens in this particular case we should all stay aware and alert, and report suspicious or unusual activities we see to the police department. As part of improving public safety, I invite all residents to attend National Night Out on August 3, where you can meet members of our police department and learn how we can be part of making our town safer. More information about National Night Out will be available soon.

On a lighter note, I had the pleasure this month of attending a celebration of the 90th anniversary of the Town Charter's adoption at the Crescent Cities center organized by the Riverdale Business Association. Former Mayor Ann Ferguson presented an especially nice set of historical highlights, and I learned a lot about the history of Leland Hospital, which was located where Crescent Cities is now located. Ward 2's Audrey Bragg, President of the Riverdale Park Business Association, kept the speakers on schedule and the event moving as Master of Ceremonies. I thank her and everyone else

involved in organizing the event for a fun evening.

Public Works Report

Saturday Drop Off of Bulk Trash – Starting July 1, 2010, the frequency of Saturday drop off of bulk trash at the DPW facility will be changed from weekly to the third Saturday of each month, 9:00 AM to 2:00 PM

ONLY. The schedule over the next six (6) months is as follows: July 17, August 21, September 18, October 16, November 20, and December 18.

Saturday Drop Off of Bulk Trash will be on the following Saturdays for the months of July and August.

- July 17, 2010 – 9:00 AM – 2:00 PM
- August 21, 2010 – 9:00 AM – 2:00 PM

Holiday Trash Collection – There will be no regular trash collection on Monday, July 5th due to the holiday on Sunday, July 4, 2010. Regular trash will be picked up on Thursday, July 8, 2010.

Banners for Town Center – the DPW will install colorful banners on the Town's street light poles to enhance the appearance of our Town Center. Residents are asked to share their opinions by contacting the department by phone on 301-864-1803.

Yard Waste - Yard waste is collected on Wednesdays and should be at curbside by 7:00 a.m. on Wednesdays. Yard waste includes branches, shrubs and trees; bundle items and tie with rope or string (do not use wire). Items must be less than 4 feet long, not more than 4 inches in diameter and weigh less than 60 pounds. These items are collected by Bates Trash and Trucking Company

These materials are NOT ACCEPTED for Collection - Roof shingles, dirt, rocks, concrete, bricks, tree trunks (over 3" diameter), stumps, pressurized containers, explosives, paint (unless paint is dry in cans), poisons, caustics, any hazardous materials, construction and demolition debris, asbestos, free liquids, sewage, sludge. Residents must make private arrangements to dispose of these items.

Seniors Circle – Listed below are a few important resources, provided by Prince George's County Department of Family Services Administration on Aging that may be of use to some of you. A different list will be provided monthly. If you are in need of any of these services, or have questions, please contact Prince George's County's Administration on Aging at 301-265-2450.

Heats on – Water's Off - Is a partnership program that offers free inspection, service and repair of plumbing and heating equipment for individuals who are elderly and/or disabled. In addition free installation of smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors is available. Partners in the program include the Prince George's County Department of Family Services, Prince George's County Fire Department and local mechanical service contractors.

Retired and Seniors Volunteer Services - Provides volunteer opportunities for over 400 seniors, age 55 and older. Volunteers serve in a variety of interesting and challenging assignments at over 50 non-profit organizations, schools and government agencies. In addition, RSVP offers such programs as friendly visiting, telephone reassurance, tutoring to school aged children, and provides supportive services to community and government agencies. This program is supported by county general and grant funds.

Foster Grandparent Program - Provides opportunities for older volunteers to work with physically, mentally and emotionally handicapped children in schools and special

centers throughout the county. These children would otherwise be without the personal attention necessary for their social adjustment and maturation. This program is supported by county general and grant funds.

Community Living Direct Supports Program - Designed to assist individuals at risk of nursing home placement and spend down to Medicaid to receive home and community based services that will enable them to continue to live in the community. The program allows the participant flexibility to make decisions about the best way to meet their needs and receive services. This program is supported by state and Federal Funds.
