Town of Riverdale Park Fair Summary of Ordinance 2015-OR-02 Town FY 2016 Budget and Tax Rates

This is to give notice that the Riverdale Park Town Council has introduced and intends to take action on Ordinance 2015-OR-02.

Ordinance 2015-OR-02 would adopt operating and capital budgets for the Town of Riverdale Park for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2016; set rates of real, personal and operating property taxation for such fiscal year and levy such taxes; and address matters generally relating to the adoption of Town budgets and levying of taxes and setting of tax rates for the Town of Riverdale Park for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2016.

Ordinance 2015-OR-02 is available for inspection by the public at Town Hall during normal business hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

A Stop Work Order may be issued if construction, repairs, fence, or any type of renovations are being done without the proper permits. Fines may also be imposed.

A Letter from Riverdale Park Police Chief Morris

"The history of policing in the United States is replete with tipping points that have led to continuous change in how law enforcement accomplishes its ultimate mission of providing the best service to our communities. Deserved or undeserved, the image of law enforcement nationally has been tarnished by a few very unfortunate situations. However, the executive boards of the Maryland Chiefs of Police Association (MCPA), Maryland Sheriffs' Association (MSA) and Maryland Municipal

League Police Executives Association (MMLPEA) fully recognize that these situations are not reflective of the dedication, commitment, and hard work exhibited by our Maryland police officers and deputies every day. We also understand and appreciate the difficult task of policing in a free, democratic society entitled to the maximum protections afforded by the Constitution. The responsibility to offer those protections is real and ultimately poses the challenge to law enforcement, which is confronted with the obligation and duty to offer those protections.

The recent law enforcement encounters captured in the media spotlight have brought about yet another tipping point, which most certainly will lead to unprecedented change within our profession. As leaders of Maryland law enforcement, the MCPA, MSA and MMLPEA acknowledge that the problems are real, that solutions need to come from the experts in the field, and that we must take positive steps to ensure the protection of Constitutional freedoms while also delicately balancing and protecting the due process rights of our officers and deputies who are tasked with doing this difficult job.”

The preceding is an excerpt of an open letter to Maryland Law Enforcement collectively offered by the presidents of the Maryland Chiefs of Police, Maryland Sheriffs and Maryland Municipal League Police Executives Associations. As your Chief of Police, I offered this forward because I believe in its message. To provide the men and women of the Riverdale Park Police Department the requisite skills to deliver the best possible service to our community, committed to Constitutional policing, we dedicate tremendous time, attention and resources to continuing education designed to promote community confidence in your law enforcement professionals. As your Chief, I take pride in providing our community with a brief insight into the type of education and training your officers have recently undertaken, namely the:

- FBI National Academy
- Police Executive Research Forum (PERF) Senior Management Institute for Police
- Northwestern University School of Police Staff and Command
- FBI - Law Enforcement Executive Development Seminar
- Maryland Municipal League Police Executive Association – Professional Development Seminar
- Maryland Chiefs & Sheriffs Professional Development Conference

Participation in these executive programs extends from the Chief down through our sergeants, our first-line supervisors, offering advanced and contemporary educational curricula. In addition, Lieutenant Colonel Timmons and I recently completed a program including instruction on Constitutional Literacy offered by Chris Dreisbach, PhD., Johns Hopkins University, and an overview of The Role of the Justice Department and FBI in Color of Law Issues offered by DOJ’s Civil Rights Division and Community Relations Services. These programs reinforced the important message that law enforcement’s first duty is to protect the rights of our citizens.

With that said, I would be remiss if I did not acknowledge that law enforcement operates all day, every day, in a gray area. Police officers are all too often confronted with split-second decisions that sometimes end tragically. No police call for service is ever routine; every traffic stop, every unknown trouble call, every suspicious person call, every fight call, every domestic violence call, every armed assailant call presents unknown dangers to the responding officers. As of this writing, forty-five police

officers have been killed in the line of duty in the United States in 2015, simply because they wore a uniform and they took an oath to protect their communities from harm.

Yet, despite such risk, I am constantly encouraged by the support I hear expressed by our Riverdale Park community for our officers. It is clear to me that our community recognizes the difficult task facing law enforcement and appreciates the efforts of the men and women of the RPPD who serve as your community police department. Working cooperatively with statewide law enforcement professionals, citizen advocacy groups, and state and local leaders, the RPPD remains committed to enhancing training and accountability standards. The RPPD, along with Mayor Archer and our town council, is working hard for you, our community, serving with pride and unparalleled commitment to ensure our town is safe, clean and beautiful. My message to the men and women of the RPPD is simple: Hold your heads high, be proud of the profession you serve, perform your jobs with professional decorum, and above all else, stay safe. Our promise to the community is equally simple: The RPPD is committed to service, honor, integrity, and professionalism, striving always to serve those who place their trust in us.

Ward Two Report

I'd like to start my report by thanking everyone who came out to vote on May 4th. Ward 2 had a fabulous turnout, and I had some great discussions with voters at the polls. I am honored to be able to serve all residents of Ward 2 for the next two years.

Taxes

Last month's Town Crier had an article that started out with the sentence "*The Mayor and Council of the Town of Riverdale Park propose to increase real property taxes.*" The language of this article, required by State law, is misleading. The current version of the budget has exactly the same tax rate as last year's budget, and assessments for houses were last updated in 2013, and will not be updated again until next year. So, why the sentence? Because the assessments of some *commercial* properties have increased, and several town homes in the EYA development we share with Hyattsville

have been completed and are now on our tax rolls, we will have more *revenue* next year. Current homeowners should see no changes in either their tax rate or their tax bill.

Budget

The Finance Committee met on May 16 to work through the budget, and I am essentially certain that we will pass it (with some modest changes from the proposed budget that was introduced in May) at the June 1 Legislative session.

Sad News

It is with a heavy heart that I write about the passing of Judy Glaes, a long-time resident of Ward 1 and a major proponent of the Dog Park, who died in April as the result of an accident in her home. I met Judy at the Riverdale Bookshop many years ago, and found her to be a very thoughtful, kind, and caring individual. She was a valuable member of our community and I will miss her, both as a friend and as a community activist. I extend my condolences to all of Judy's friends and family, particularly to her partner Rob Oppenheim, who represented Ward 1 on the Town Council.

In another tragic accident, Ward 2 resident Rebecca Selleck was killed after being struck by a train while crossing the CSX tracks at a pedestrian crossing in College Park. I did not know Ms. Selleck, but have heard from others that she was a caring and giving person. I again extend my condolences to her family and friends.

I encourage everyone to be extremely careful while crossing the railroad tracks – the trains can move very fast, and it's hard to judge how soon a train will arrive. There have been many deaths on the tracks in Riverdale Park over the years, and we don't want any more.

Dog Park

Construction of the long-discussed Dog Park near the corner of 51st and Tuckerman will start in the next month or two, and is supposed to be complete in late August. If you would like to be updated as we learn more about the schedule, please contact me or Mayor Archer so we can keep you in the loop.

Farmers' Market

Now that spring is heading into summer, the Farmers' Market is really humming! It is open every Thursday from 3pm to 7pm in the main parking lot in Town Center. Produce at the market this time of year includes spring mix, collards, mustard, baby kale, head lettuce, radishes, spicy salad mix, arugula, mini head lettuce, dandelion greens, and microgreens, fruit preserves, apples, pastured meats, free range hen eggs, fresh small batch roasted coffees, and a beautiful variety of cut flowers. There are some new farmers and vendors at the market this year, including a vendor with fantastic wild Alaskan salmon. I hope to see you at the market!

Public Works Report

Saturday Drop Off

The next scheduled dates in 2015 for drop off of bulk trash on the third Saturday of each

month, from 9:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m., are: **June 20**, July 18, August 15, September 19, October 17, November 21 and December 19.

WSSC Water Main Contract

The contract (#BR767A08), 10-inch water main will be installed on East/West Highway from Adelphi Road to 44th Avenue. The contract started in April 2015 and will continue through the fall season. There will be two tie-ins made within town limits– 44th Avenue and 43rd Street - that will be affected by this contract. However, the impact to westbound traffic on East/West Highway is going to be problematic.

Tree Trimming

A vendor is in the community removing and/or trimming Town trees. If the tree designated for removal/trimming is located in front/near your property, you will receive a notice from the Department of Public Works. The contractor will post signs for when they will be in the area.

Pepco will be in the community trimming and/or removing trees as part of their efforts to clear power cables. This process is necessary to minimize loss of power during major storms.

Yard Waste Collection

As a reminder, effective January 1, 2014, the Waste Management Division of the Prince George's County Department of Environmental Resources issued a notice (included in resident's August 2013 tax bill) that requires **ALL yard waste** to be placed in brown paper bags or loose in a **clearly marked "YARD WASTE" collection can/container (i.e., trash cans)**. Yard waste will no longer be collected in plastic bags. For additional information please call 311 or 301-883-5810.

Mosquito Control Program

The Town will once again participate in the State/County Mosquito Larviciding/Adulticiding Mosquito Control Program. The program began spring larviciding in March. The regular season began April 6th and will continue into early September.

Adulticiding will begin June 1, 2015, and run through September 17, 2015. They will visit every three weeks, but will not spray if the sprayer encounters too many people on the night of spraying.

In order to reduce the presence of mosquitos, residents must keep their property free of mosquito breeding containers, stagnant water, bird baths, wading pools, pet watering dishes, tin cans, old tires, clogged gutters or flower pots. Other water holding containers should be stored upside down.

Prince George's County Information

To expedite requests for services provided by Prince George's County's, residents should utilize their information number, **which is 311**. Using that number will enable residents to address county related concerns such as questions, complaints, animal control requests, or other service needs for which the county is responsible.

Animal Control

The Department of Environmental Resources – Animal Management Division handles **all calls** related to animal control in your community. Please contact them if there are animals in a trap, sick, any cruelty to animals, animal spaying or neutering, dangerous animals, animal carcasses, or other animal related issues in your neighborhood, please call the Animal Management Division at **301-780-7200**. **Office hours are Monday, Tuesday and Friday, 11:30 a.m. – 7:30 p.m., and Saturday, 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Closed Sundays and Thursdays.**

The public can view animals on Monday, Tuesday and Friday 12:00 noon – 6:00 p.m. and on Saturday from 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Closed Sundays and Thursdays. The office is located at 3750 Brown Station Road, Upper Marlboro 20772.


