TASTING THE PAST: A CIDER SAMPLER

Rosalie Calvert, the mistress of Riversdale, bragged to her father that the cider produced at Riversdale was “almost as good as champagne,” and the drink impressed visitors, including the British Ambassador of the time. Take a step back into the culinary past as you enjoy a **Cider Sampler** on Saturday, November 10, at 2pm. Learn about the art and history of cider making while tasting your way through a guided sampling of Crispin Ciders paired with historically-inspired foods. Based out of Minneapolis, Crispin Cider offers a variety of classic hard ciders, as well as artisanal and imported varieties.

This event is open to guests ages 21 and up. The cost is \$15 for residents of Prince George's & Montgomery Counties and \$18 for non-residents. Advance payment is required by November 2. The cost includes all food and drink and a souvenir glass.

SEASONAL SELECTIONS: FROM GARDEN TO TABLE

The *Seasonal Selections* program, instituted in the fall of 2009, will continue to offer special monthly cooking events with a different topic each month. Holidays, the schedule of seasonal fresh produce, and/or the traditional cycles of an early 19th century farm will inspire each month's *Seasonal Selection*. The Riversdale Kitchen Guild will host the final Seasonal Selection of the year, *Fall Feast*, on November 11. The demonstration runs from noon – 3:30pm. TOWN OF RIVERDALE PARK FAIR SUMMARY OF ORDINANCE 2012-OR-11

This is to give notice that the Riverdale Park Town Council has introduced and intends to take action on Ordinance 2012-OR-11.

Ordinance 2012-OR-11 would amend the Town of Riverdale Park budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2012 and ending June 30, 2013 by increasing General Government Expenditures in the General Fund and transferring unallocated funds from the FY13 CIP Fund to the General Fund.

Ordinance 2012-OR-11 is available for inspection by the public at Town Hall during normal business hours, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Mayor's Report

Youth and Community Wing Expansion to Town Hall

In September's Town Crier I reported to you that the Town's architect and planner Paul Mortensen was busy working to provide us with design alternatives for our proposed expansion of Town Hall to accommodate a greater array of community activities. I am happy to report that he delivered two alternative designs and we are now able to move on to the next steps of the planning phase.

One design is a two-story alternative which thoroughly addresses stated needs and Guiding Design Principles developed from community input and is presented on the next page. This design would virtually double the floor space in the building; substantially improve the flexibility of how the floor space can be used; and will handle some expansion of demand beyond what we are currently experiencing (that is to say some additional uses would be able to be accommodated beyond current demand).

The second alternative stays with the existing one-story building, with only a small addition to the building. This design concentrates on providing more efficiency and flexibility in the use of floor space. It would not be able to support some of the community based activities that were identified earlier in the planning process, but would represent a significant improvement over our current Town Hall.

We are now anxious to get feedback from the community on the designs in order to help inform the architect and ultimately the council about how we should proceed. We will have to weigh issues of utility, needs vs. simple desires, cost, and impacts on town services during construction as well as in the completed project.

In the Council Work Session on Monday, November 26, we will begin the process of evaluating the proposals. Please come out and be a part of it! Also, feel free to contact your councilmembers and/or me directly to share your thoughts. We are also planning a presentation that will be presented in Spanish for our residents that need interpreting in order to have their input added, but we have not yet selected a date for that.



Ward One Report

Economic Development Committee Report

My favorite time of year in Maryland has always been October. The sting of winter is not quite in the air and the oppressive heat and humidity from the summer are a distant memory. I would like to take this opportunity to recognize two young adults in town: Kelsey Jarman and Andrew Waldron. Kelsey won one of the two Lion's Club scholarships that were presented last month. She is an exceptional young woman studying up at Towson University. Andrew studies at UMD and was also recognized with an honorable mention. I think it speaks volumes about the types of parents we have in town to raise such rising young stars. Great things are expected from both of them.

The M-U-TC Committee, Town Council, and staff have busily been evaluating the next phase of the Cafritz/Whole Foods development – the Preliminary Plan of Subdivisions (PPS). The applicant has had many meetings with Park and Planning staff in preparation for this next phase. At the time of writing this update however, we have not had a chance to discuss a certified copy of the development plan. I strongly suspect that there will be many meetings over the next 4-6 weeks as we go over the minutiae as well as highly germane details. We look forward to having a healthy and productive debate with the entire Cafritz team.

Many of you may have noticed increased code enforcement activity in and around town. This was due to the town's "Safe, Clean, and Beautiful, Quality of Life Initiative" that was run through the month of October. As a recipient of two Orange stickers for code violations over the last 4 years, I know only too well what people's immediate reaction is. I would ask everyone to remember that individually we all have an obligation to our immediate neighbors and the community as a whole to do our part to keep our homes and yards looking great! I believe firmly that Chief Morris and his staff do an exceptional job of keeping us safe day in and day out and initiatives like this are one more tool that can be used to ensure blight is minimized and Riverdale Park is and remains a great place to live and work.

My number one goal since being elected last year has been to address the vacant properties in and

around Ward One. The two prominent ones are Jey's Auto and the Douglas Development Assemblage at Town Center. The Council passed a resolution last fall and a follow-up one this September that moves the ball forward with Jey in no uncertain terms. There has been enormous developer interest over the last few weeks in the property due to our actions and the fact that EYA-East is coming on-line. Ultimately there are two paths forward on this property, one through town actions and one through third-party development but both lead to the same conclusion; at some point in the next year or two the development parcel will no longer be the neglected eyesore that it is today.

The more exciting piece is concerning Douglas Development. I met with Matt Jemal and staff last year outlining my vision for the Town Center and brought him and his staff up to speed on what is going on in the area (EYA, Cafritz, Town Center Market, and Trolley Trail). As the Cafritz rezoning and Town Center Market build-out progressed I sent out informational packets to keep them updated. Late this fall I asked County Councilman Olson's office to assist in a full-court press. Many of you know that Dannielle Glaros is CM Olson's Chief of Staff and lives in town; what you may not know is how instrumental she has been as a political partner to move the development forward.

As it stands, we have commitment from the Douglas Development team to bring the properties up to code on the inside and ready for commercial and residential tenants. There have been several meetings with the Douglas Development folks, County Council staff, the retail leasing consulting staff, Riverdale Park Council and staff, and the County Redevelopment Authority. In the last meeting, the Douglas project manager communicated a timeline of 3-5 months for the build-out. I suspect that may be an optimistic number but nonetheless am excited at the prospect of having a viable commercial center in 2013. Again, the town owes a large degree of gratitude and thanks to CM Eric Olson for putting this project on his radar screen and especially to Chief of Staff Dannielle Glaros for her diligence and management of the details.

In closing, I would just like to say thank you to all of you. It has been an exceptionally challenging time to be an elected official (especially a new one) and many of you have taught me lessons on how to better govern. I am always here to listen and will do whatever I can to make Riverdale Park a vibrant and safe community to live and raise a family.

Finance Committee Report

Late in September we had a public safety walk through Ward 2. Several members of the Police Department (including Chief Morris, several police officers, Code Manager Colleen Ferguson, and two code enforcement officers) joined me, Council Members Ebbeler and Lingua, and residents to walk through most of Ward 2 looking to identify any public safety issues. I talked with many of you while walking through, and was pleased to find only relatively small issues needing attention. The police department and public works will be following up on those. These walks should be occurring regularly so watch the Town Crier for the schedule of the next one (which will probably happen in the spring).

October 6 was a fabulous Riverdale Park Day, as always. I was able to eat the one funnel cake I allow myself every year, and my son loved the video game booth, the "Angry Birds" real-life slingshot game, and the police dog demo. I enjoyed talking to people at the Town's booth about options for the future Youth and Community expansion of Town Hall, and renewing my family's membership in the Riverdale Arts Council at their booth. Please join me in thanking the Recreation Board for organizing the event, and thanks to all of you who turned out.

Residents on the northern end of Taylor Road have a new neighbor – a woman from Hyattsville who purchased a vacant lot, and is planning to run a farm on it! I've exchanged e-mails with her, and spoken with many nearby neighbors, who are generally fine with having a farm in their neighborhood. While I was initially surprised that this was allowed in a neighborhood like ours (county zoning does permit it), I'm hoping that we will find the farm to be a good neighbor, which I think will be the case based on what I know about the owner. I hope you will contact me if you would like to talk to me about this further.

In addition to the farm, Ward 2 has another new neighbor, the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Center for Weather and Climate Prediction, which officially opened on October 15. I attended the ribbon cutting ceremony where US Senator Barbara Mikulski, Secretary of Commerce Rebecca Blank, County Executive Rushern Baker, and University of Maryland President Wallace Loh (among others) all spoke glowingly of the new facility and the advances in weather prediction they think will come

about as a result of the work going on there. This facility, which crosses the border between Riverdale Park and College Park, will be an engine for economic growth in town as well as a point of pride.

The Finance Committee met late in October to discuss minor changes to this year's budget; I will report on what happened at the November Town Council meeting and next month's Town Crier.

Please join me this month at our town's Veteran's Monument on Veteran's Day (Sunday, November 11th) to honor veterans of all wars, and enjoy a safe and happy Thanksgiving with family and friends.

Bulk Trash Pickups & Special Trash Pickups

Bulk Trash pickups are scheduled by **APPOINTMENT ONLY**. In order to have bulk items picked up on Wednesdays, you must call Bates Trash and Trucking Company at 301-773-2069, before 2:00 PM on Tuesdays.

Items must be at curbside by 7:00 AM on Wednesdays. Bates is not required to pick up more than **THREE (3) bulk items from any one-family dwelling per week**. If you have more than three (3) items, you can make another pick up appointment on the following Wednesday.

The following items will **not** be picked up: building materials, concrete, bricks, roof shingles, stumps,

bamboo, pressurized containers, explosives, paint (unless paint is dry in cans), poisons, caustics, construction and demolition debris, asbestos, toilets, free liquids, sewage, sludge. Boy Scouts Troop 252

On 28 September, Scouts from Troop 252 and Baltimore Area Council's Troop 602 camped out in Scoutmaster Killen's back yard. We set up our tipi and tents, and some Scouts and Scouters decided to "sleep under the stars." Scouts and Scouters alike fed the fire almost all night long from twigs they picked up and cut out of the pile of downed limbs from past storms. We cooked and ate hot dogs for supper and s'mores and bug juice for our Cracker Barrel. We went to bed early Saturday morning, after identifying many constellations in the clear night sky. We breakfasted on eggs cooked in zip lock bags (no dishes to wash), in a pot (soaped to ease cleaning) almost full of boiling water over the campfire, which we rejuvenated after a good (short) night's sleep. On 12 October, Scouts and Scouters from Troop 252 went to Phyllis E. Williams Elementary School in Largo, set up our tipi and two metal half-drums in which we kept fires and hot coals for s'mores which apparently was a large attraction for the students - the temperature dropped to 28 degrees, and the tops of our tents iced up. Most of the folks watched the outdoor movie from the comfort of the half-drum fires. The rest of them went to their tents early.

As I write this column, Troop 252 is planning to camp out at the National Capital Park and Planning Commission's 4th Annual American Indian Festival on 19-21 October at Jug Bay (Patuxent River Park), one of our most favorite camping places, where there will be "traditional and contemporary music, drumming, singing, dancing, regalia, interactive exhibits and

demonstrations, Indian games, arts and crafts, archery, Native horsemanship and bareback riding demos, living history reenactment of primitive life skills, storytelling, and live birds of prey."

We'll be skiing, snowboarding and tubing when the snow falls, and cold-weather (Okpik) camping, biking and hiking, too.
